Symbol Design attempts to consider good form and meaning in context

Why	We will consider Symbol Design (the course) an opportunity to evolve and adapt basic concepts discussed in other communication design courses.		Understanding the inner workings of meaning-making and form-giving ¹ can be thought of as a refresher course in fundamentals of communication with potential immediate real-world applications?	
What	Over the first week of Symbol Design, we explore how materials, processes, scale, context and intent? can be useful tools in giving meaning to form. We will attempt form-giving exercises, approaching the task from a pre-set-brief perspective and then a post-rationalising ³ one. We may also investigate other dimensions (literally and otherwise) to static symbols on paper with inputs from the students on the media they (you ⁴) prefer working with.		During the second week, we develop our own design-briefs and execute a 'typical' symbol design project from start to finish. Ideally (and not necessarily), the exercise contributes to one of our studio projects or a special interest project.	
What For	<i>Rediscover how to use symbols to communicate meaning</i> , and—as communication designers with intent—try to learn how to manipulate their (symbols') formal qualities to attempt controlling the way they are interpreted.		<i>Appreciate good form</i> and find-and-improve-upon ways to achieve what may be considered good form. (Balanced, rhythmic, harmonious, etc.)
